East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Parish Sustainability Matrix if adopted this summer will replace the Village Plan, which for Welwick, will see no further expansion of residential development except conversions of existing buildings and possibly a small amount of infill.

### Around the Village in Times Past

Whilst researching for her book on the history of Welwick, Ann Stothard came across the following information, written here as recorded which documented the belongings of a recently deceased inhabitant. He was obviously a wealthy person but where exactly did he live in the village?

*June 8th 1690 A true and perfect inventory of all the goods, chattels and credits of William Spraggon of Welwick in Holderness in the County of York, husbandman, late deceased, appraized by four credible and indifferent men, viz:-*

*John Coy, Thomas Stutt, Joseph Bylith, Robert Hunter*

*Imprinis (in the first place) his purse and apparel £2.10s.0d*

*Items in the house a table and frame with a press chairs, stools, pewther (pewter?) brass + other implemts £4.15s.0d.*

*In ye Milk house, trayes, churnes, canns + other milk vessell £2.0s.0d*

*In the little chamber two chests + linnen in them £3.10s.0d*

*In the Great Chamber, two servants beds with wheat, rye malt and other implemts £4.0s.0d*

*In the Parlour two beds furnished + two chests with a Dresser + other Implemts £8.0s.0d*

*Two Maires, + three other young horses £8.0s.0d*

*four kine, two oxon, four steeres, + two steeres more with a stott and a Quy ('coo' or cow?) + four calves and a little lambe £32.0s.0d*

*13 couple of ewes and lambes and 13 other sheep £7 18s 6d*

*swine, geese and hens £1.14s 8d*  
*a waine (rope?), plow, harrowes and other husbandry geere with fire elding £5.0s.0d*

*20 acres of corn on the ground £20.0s.0d*

*for forgotten goods if any such be £0.3s.4d.*

The whole came to £99 11s 6d and after paying out his debts of £13 6s 6d his net estate was worth £86.5s.0d – a sizable amount in those far off days.
